## **DEPUTY GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT**



*Do not imagine that I have come to abolish the Law...-Matthew 5:17*

Recently The Catholic Times announced a number of revisions to canon law. A recent online article by MSNBC claimed there would be 40,000 new laws enacted in 2012. These articles provoked several questions. How many laws do we need? What is a law? What do they mean? What do laws do? Understandably, laws help guide us through the day-to-day activities of life, but we can become dependent upon laws and fail to challenge ourselves to go deeper, to be covenantal in our relationships.

Nominally, laws are contracts for the promotion of the common good. The word law comes from the Old Norse word lagu "to measure," contract derives from the Latin *contrahere*, "to draw together". Therefore, we say laws are contracts that draw us together and measure our expressions of right and wrong. The lexis of most laws are negative. If you do or do not do this, you will experience that. Exceed the speed limit; get a ticket, come late to work; termination, file your taxes late; fines and imprisonment. Throughout history, we have seen that laws alone do not change hearts.

It was the case when God provided the first law, which was subsequently broken when Adam and Eve ate of the tree (c.f. Gen 3). It was the same when the Israelites' left Egypt. They did not keep his laws, and as a result, they wandered for forty years through the desert. Today, we see extravagance that extends beyond all imagination and poverty so absurd that it crushes the imagination. Although lawful, how do we reconcile such disparity with Christ's asking us to, "Love one another, as I have loved you" (John 15:12)

Many times our adherence to laws depends upon our fear of being caught and the significance of the punishment, which may result. Consider, our highways have posted speed limits, the maximum allowed by law. Yet, how many times have we exceeded that limit? Other times obeying the laws flows from our understanding of what is just. For example, the 18th amendment, this banned the sale, manufacture, and transportation of alcohol in the United States and many thought of this as an unjust overreach of government. The intention of the ban was to reduce criminal and societal troubles. Ironically, they increased. Because the law prohibited the sale completely, old laws that regulated the sale of alcohol with common sense and compassion became unenforceable. Women and children began to frequent the speakeasies. Across all demographics, alcoholism became more prevalent, especially in woman and children. Boot legging and gang activities went up. Today when we read the news, it can seem that only laws change and hearts do not.

Our hearts change through free will, a willingness to listen with humility, and our desire to open our hearts to God's grace. We as Catholic men have the unique opportunity to receive God's grace through frequent use of the sacraments of reconciliation, and Holy Communion. It is our humble "yes" to God's grace, our willingness to be a voice in the wilderness, which will rouse hearts to change. It is that same humility, openness, and trust that separates contracts from covenants.

Whereas a contract is compulsory, detailing terms, specifying rewards and penalties, and offering protections, a covenant is a mutual agreement, binding individuals to create a community of goodness. A covenant is an investment, where we share in development of others and ourselves alike. A covenant requires us to deepen our commitment of faith and hope, to be charitable, and be man enough to be vulnerable in order to serve each other's legitimate needs.

Although covenantal, laws govern our membership in the Church, our place in the community. However, it is by having the fortitude to serve with humility, magnanimity, and letting the law guide us in our efforts that enables us to lead the way for hope and change, living our covenantal relationship with God, our spouses, families, and fellow man.

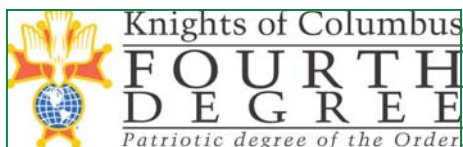

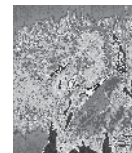

**Still have just group insurance?**

As a Knights of Columbus field agent, I hear about group life insurance every week. If you have it, it's certainly not a bad thing, but it can be a misleading security blanket. Most times, the amount offered is far from what you need, and the only way to determine what you need is with a comprehensive needs analysis. Your group coverage is not based on any analysis. Most group life insurance coverage reduces or disappears when you retire. Many times it can be converted, but at a very expensive premium (remember, you're no kid anymore when you retire, and premiums do rise as you get older). Just because you turn 65 doesn't mean you no longer need life insurance or need less coverage. Actually, the opposite is true.

Do you still own just group life insurance? It must be supplemented with a personally owned portfolio. I can tell you exactly how to blend your group benefit with your K of C life insurance so things can be in your control. Don't let the feeling of security that group life provides distract you from the real issue: taking control of your family's financial future!

The youth will also be hosting an "All you can eat" pancake breakfast on Sunday, January 15th from 8am-noon at St. Elizabeth's. All proceeds from the breakfast will also go to fund the youth pilgrimage to DC. Cost is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children 12 and under.

They will be taking out a full-page signature ad in the La Crosse Tribune on Sunday, January 22, 2012. Sheets will be available for you to add your name, following all Masses, the weekend of January 14 & 15. WI Right to Life is asking for a donation of \$2 per name or \$5 per family to help off-set the cost of the ad.

The La Crosse chapter of Wisconsin Right to Life is also sponsoring a peaceful demonstration in front of Gundersen Lutheran on Saturday, January 21st, from 10-11 a.m. to protest their policy on abortion. All are welcome to participate and WI Right to Life will provide signs. Please join them in standing up for the unborn.

As you prayerfully consider what you can do to help protect our unborn brothers and sisters (and future Knights), consider these words of Jesus..."Truly, I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these my brothers, you did for me." Mt. 25:40.

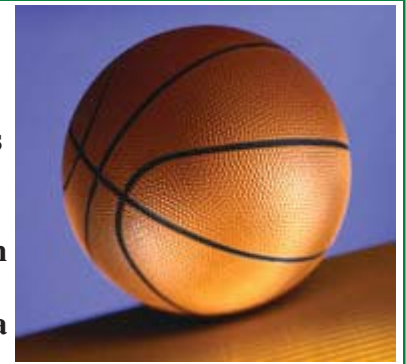
